Washington Dual Credit Summit:

Strengthening Programs and Addressing Equality

CALL FOR PROPOSALS

We invite you to share your experience, best practices and expertise with your peers from all across Washington State that work in the Dual Credit programs. Submit a proposal from **December 16, 2019** to **January 17, 2020**. All presentation topics that align with the Summit Strands are welcome to provide a diverse experience for all participants.

Target Audience: Educators, Administrators and practitioners in middle school, high school, higher education institutions and agencies that work directly with or support students in dual credit programs and/or have a policy role within their organization.

Summit Strands: Proposed sessions should align with one of the following strands, within the overarching theme of advancing equity in Dual Credit/Enrollment programs. Example session topics are included in the descriptions below, though these examples are not exhaustive.

Designing Pathways (e.g. High School and Beyond Plan implementation, credit transfer, "stacking" dual credit opportunities across programs, master calendar structure)

Data, Measurement, and Research (e.g. using student/systems data for continuous improvement, overview of state data, local/national research and reports)

Student and Family Support (e.g. wraparound supports for first-year, full-time high credit students, identifying and equipping "kid magnets" for advising, equipping high school counselors with timely dual credit information, student/family communication)

Partnerships (e.g. innovative partnership models between K-12 and post-secondary, perspectives on admissions and advising, credit transfer)

Funding & Policy (e.g. innovative funding models, mapping known barriers to proposed policy changes, overview of Dual Credit policies, Dual Credit in Washington 101)

Please read the following submission criteria:

- 1. **Eligibility for submission**: Those who are involved in administration, advising, admissions, counseling or research related to any of the dual credit programs is eligible to submit a proposal.
- Identification of Strand: Proposals must align to one of the Summit Strands that are set within the context of strengthening programs and addressing equity: *Designing Pathways; Data, Measurement and Research; Student and Family Support; Partnerships; Funding & Policy*
- 3. **Deliverables and/or Take Aways**: Proposals must clearly outline what content, resources, and/or tools will be shared with participants that improve Dual Credit implementation and/or policy toward equitable outcomes for students.
- 4. Format options: All formats should include an interactive component
 - a. **Workshop:** General topics that will generate an exchange of ideas/practices between the participants and the presenters. Issues and ideas related to specific dual credit programs or a more generalized view. Feedback and discourse is expected from those attending the session. Introduce an idea, explore thoughts and search for answers to problems of practice.
 - b. **Panel Discussion:** Bringing together various presenters from different institutions or different lenses of the dual credit programs to discuss specific agenda items and ask for questions/feedback from the audience.
 - c. **Topic Presentation:** Focused on a specific dual credit issue or topic of research. Includes best practices or innovative solutions. May be cross-sectional in representation of presenters.
- 5. **Session Length**: All sessions are scheduled to run for 60 minutes. We recommend that you build in time into your presentation for Q&A from the audience.

Although the program committee will make every effort to honor your requested format option, the committee may recommend an alternate format in order to accept as many proposals as possible.
